An Overview of Romans 9 – 11

A. Introduction

- Romans 9 11 give us the <u>basic and foundational doctrines</u> in understanding God's heart and purpose for Israel based on Scripture. They are the starting point of the journey to grow deeper in knowledge and understanding of God's heart for Israel
- 2. This is a passage of Scripture pertaining to the heart and purposes of God for Israel that is necessary for Gentile believers to know.
- 3. These chapters need to be read and studied together in one continuous flow in order to understand God's heart for Israel.

B. A Brief Outline of Romans 9 – 11

Romans 9: The Divine Election of Israel

- 1. Apostolic zeal and burden for Israel based on the Word of God (v.1-3);
- 2. <u>Eight-fold divine entrustments</u> to Israel (v.4–5);
 - a. The adoption (Ex. 4:22);
 - b. The glory (Ex. 19);
 - c. The Covenants: Abrahamic (Gen. 12; 15), Mosaic (Exo. 19; Deut. 28 29), Davidic (2 Sam. 7:1–17), New (Jer. 31:31–34);
 - d. The giving of the Law (Ex. 20);
 - e. The service of God (temple ministry and the priesthood);
 - f. The promises (Isa. 60 66);
 - g. The fathers and the Patriarchs (the Old Testament);
 - h. The lineage through which Christ would come.
- 3. The presumption by Israel concerning her divine election (v.6–13)
 - a. Election not based on natural descent but faith in God (v.6–9);
 - b. Election not based on human merit, but the sovereign will of God (v.10–13).
- 4. The mystery of election (v.14–23)
 - a. The election of Israel reveals the righteousness and mercy of God (v.14–16);
 - b. The election of Israel reveals the sovereignty of God (v.17–21);
 - c. The election of Israel reveals the justice and glory of God (v.22–23)
- 5. The divine plan of God for the redemption of the world (v.24–26)

- 6. The prophecy pertaining to the remnant of Israel (v.27–29);
- 7. The <u>cause</u> of Israel's stumbling and rejection (v.30–33).

Romans 10: Israel's Present Rejection of Yeshua

- 1. The reasons for Israel's present rejection of Yeshua (v.1–13)
 - a. Israel did not see a need for salvation (v.1);
 - b. Israel's misguided zeal for God (v.2);
 - c. Israel's pride and self-righteousness (v.3);
 - d. Israel misunderstood the Law of God (v.4–13).
- 2. The <u>remedy</u> for Israel's present rejection (v.14–17)
- 3. The <u>results</u> of Israel's present rejection of Yeshua (v.18–21)
 - a. Israel is guilty before God (v.18);
 - b. The Gospel has gone to the Gentiles (v.19–20);
 - c. However, God still yearns for His people (v.21).

Romans 11: The Eventual Restoration of Israel

- 1. The rejection of Israel by God is not total (v.1–6)
- 2. The blindness of Israel is partially pre-ordained by God (v.7–10)
- 3. The rejection of Israel by God is not final (v.11a)
- 4. The fullness of Israel will lead to God's glory filling the Millennial earth (v.11b–15)
- 5. The promise of the <u>future restoration of Israel</u> (v.16–24)
- 6. Five dimensions of the Mystery of Israel (v.25–29)
 - a. The blindness of Israel is partially pre-ordained by God (v.25);
 - b. The fullness of the Gentiles (v.25);
 - c. All Israel will be saved (v.26);
 - d. Israel is still the beloved of God (v.28);
 - e. God's call for Israel is irrevocable (v.29).

- 7. Two litmus tests of understanding the mystery of Israel (Rom. 11:33–12:1):
 - a. It must awaken awe in us for God and cause us to worship God (Rom. 11:33-36);
 - b. It must awaken us to live recklessly abandoned lives for Jesus (Rom. 12:1).

C. Conclusion

- 1. Romans 9 11 is the starting point for any serious student of the nation of Israel.
